Geography	Can identify seasonal and daily weather patterns in the United Kingdom. (Y1) Can start to talk about or ask questions about their environment. Can talk about things they have observed. Can start to understand the geographical similarities and differences by studying a small area of the UK and comparing it to a small area of a contrasting non-European country (The Rainforest). Can start to recognise human and physical geographical features. Can use world maps, atlases and globes to identify continents, oceans, the UK and other countries and oceans studied (Y2)
Art & Design	Henri Matisse Artist Study: To access and return aprons independently. Use and place work on a paint dryer Explore a range of brushes (large and small and other materials). Name basic colours. Give reason for colour choice. Experiment with colour mixing. (EYFS)	Pablo Picasso Artist Study: To explore the powder paint mixing procedure. To know how to outline an area to fill. Can choose an appropriate brush to suit purpose.	Andy Warhol & Henri Rousseau Artist Study: To understand that paint takes time to dry before adding detail. To name colours- matching to the environment (e.g. leaf green). To select different brushes for texture and detail. Introduce ‘tints’ by adding white and black to make lighter and darker. Use different techniques (e.g. dotting, scratching) to imitate an artist/style of art. (Y2)

Pablo Picasso (1881-1973) regarded as one of the most influential artists of the 20th century, he is known for the co-invention of collage and for the wide variety of artistic styles that he helped develop and explore. Captain James Cook (1728-1779) was a British explorer, famous for his voyages in the Pacific Ocean and to Australia, in particular. Matthew Henson (1866 - 1955) may have been the first person to reach the north pole. Due to segregation laws, he was not credited for his exploration until much later in life.	Continent - a large, solid area of land. Our Earth has seven continents. Ocean - a huge body of salt water. Oceans cover nearly 71% of the Earth's surface. The UK - an island country in the Atlantic Ocean, made of England, Scotland, Wales & Northern Ireland. World - the earth together, with its countries and peoples. Map - a picture or chart that shows the features of an area. Cubism - a style of art which aims to show all of the possible viewpoints of a person, or an object all at once.
