He was the country's first black head of state and the first elected in a fully representative democratic election. He fought against apartheid.</p> <p>Rosa Parks (1913-2005) an American activist in the civil rights movement, best known for her pivotal role in the Montgomery bus boycott.</p> <p>Mary Seacole (1805-1881) a British-Jamaican nurse who set up the "British Hotel" behind the lines during the Crimean War.</p> <p>Andy Warhol (1928-1987) an American artist, film director, and producer who was a leading figure in the visual art movement known as pop art.</p>	<p>Prejudice - A feeling of unfair dislike directed against an individual or a group because of some characteristic.</p> <p>Apartheid - A system for keeping white people and nonwhites separated in South Africa, in the 1950s until the early 1990s.</p> <p>Segregation - Keeping people apart. In many cases it is a form of discrimination because one group of people is treated unfairly.</p> <p>President - the head of government in countries with a presidential system.</p> <p>Civil Rights - The basic rights that every citizen has under the laws of the government</p> <p>Pop Art - a style of art based on simple, bold images of everyday items.</p>

How many litres in this bottle? Which is heavier/lighter? • Practice telling the time using analogue clocks • Look at non-fiction books about famous people and discuss the layout and features. What can we learn about this person? • Find out about famous people who have changed the world. • Accessing weekly home learning tasks via Google Classroom • Supporting the development of times tables skills via regular practice on Times Tables Rock Stars • Reading daily at home
